


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APPENDIX1

Volunteer Recruitment and Member Selection

The panel consisted of a randomly selected group of 30 volunteers from across the province that were recruited through a Civic Lottery process.

The Civic Lottery is a process for randomly choosing individuals from within a specific population so that you can assemble them for what needs to be done: in this case learn about and deliberate on selected issues about Ontario's auto insurance system. The process is based on a simple, random, and fair procedure that has been used throughout the world for centuries - the drawing of lots.

There were three approaches to the recruitment process:

- 1. In November 2021, 10,000 randomly selected Ontario households received a letter in the mail inviting a member of the household 18 years of age or older to volunteer. Approximately 180 responded to the Civic Lottery invitation.
- 2. In late November and early December, members from the 2020 Panel were reinvited to participate in the new panel process. They were first sent a mailed invitation, and then reached out via phone calls to explain this new process. Approximately eight (8) re-volunteered.
- 3. In late November and early December, unselected volunteers from the 2020 Panel were also reinvited to participate. They were sent a mailed invitation and were encouraged to call a toll-free phone line to ask questions about this new process. Approximately nine (9) re-volunteered.

From a pool of approximately 90 candidates from across the three recruitment streams, 30 Ontarians were randomly selected in a blind process, which also ensured that the panel broadly represented the demographics of Ontario.


The Civic Lottery took into account geography, age, gender, housing tenure, and identification as an Indigenous person or visible minority. The selection process also ensured that licensed drivers with cars, licensed drivers without cars, and non-drivers were all represented on the panel. In addition, a majority of the members were randomly selected from the pool of 'new' and 'old' volunteers. Selection from members of the 2020 panel was limited to six. Of the 30 members, 29 were consistent participants in the process and one member had to withdraw because of health issues.

Panelists were not experts on auto insurance but rather volunteers from diverse backgrounds who contributed their lived experience as both drivers and non-drivers to give advice on how to improve the system for all Ontarians. Provincially and federally elected officials, government employees working on auto insurance policy, and employees of insurance companies who work with auto insurance were not permitted to volunteer for the panel.

Panelists did not receive compensation for their work but were offered childcare reimbursements, a reasonable stipend to order food to their homes during meetings, and appropriate technology when necessary to be able to log into the online meetings. Panelists were also offered training and support to learn how to use the online meeting application.


